

Wide Awake: Lesson 1 Listening

Rain Stick

Objective:

1. To create an opportunity to listen carefully.

Materials:

- Paper roll (any size will do, but the longer rolls will give you a better sound)
- · Circle shaped tracer, 2-3 times the diameter of your paper roll
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Rice, 1/8 cup per rainstick
- Paper grocery bag (one bag per stick)
- Elastic bands (2 per rainstick)
- Things to decorate the outside (optional) like paint, stickers, etc
- Smartboard (optional) to show tutorial

Lesson (approx 1 hour)

Introduction:


Explain to the students that you are going to make a special instrument called a rainstick. It is thought that rainsticks originated in Central America, where people dried the arms of cactus plants, and then hammered in the spines. The seeds falling and bouncing off of the spines make a sound similar to rain.

Main Activity:

1. If you are going to decorate the outside of your paper roll, do this first. Let it dry.

2. In the meantime, take a round shape approx 2-3 times the diameter of the paper roll, and trace 2 circles on one side of your paper bag. Cut out the circles

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9. Put both of your spirals into the paper roll. Manipulate them so that they take up the whole space. If it looks to crowded, you can cut off one of your spirals so that it is shorter and fits better. You will want there to be space inside the paper roll so that the rice can travel from one end to another.



12. Tilt the rainstick and listen to the rain!
